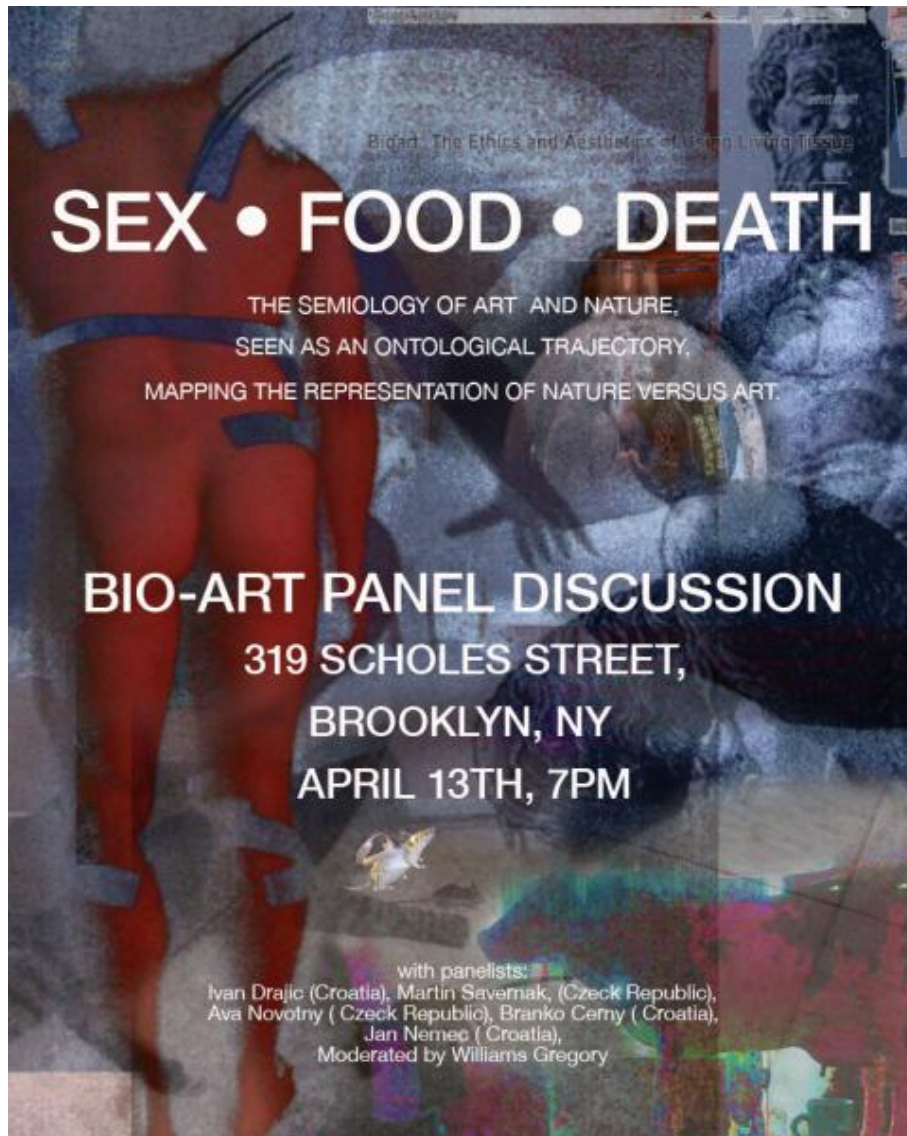

The Sex, Food, Death panel discussion will explore a range of creative tendencies that define or presage the coming biological and human integration of art and science on the microscopic-biological level. Artists Meeting, a NY based collective has invited several pioneering research authorities in the realm of bio-engineering, bio-ethics and the natural arts from the University of Life and Science of Brno, Czech Republic and the Institute for Molecular Life Sciences of Split, Croatia, to engage in a lively panel . The core of their presentations will be devoted to the exploration of the biological boundaries of art and nature, with attention paid to paleo-capitalist strategies for the next millennium. This conference will attempt to give a road map for our biological future, rooted in the upcoming advances in science. On view in the reception atrium will be artworks that engage these same ideas. There, a pre-conference face to face will be held where attendants can meet the panelists and sample edible and cocktail creations from their recent bio-research.

Artists Meeting is a New York based artists collective whose members come from a range of eclectic backgrounds. Since its official start in 2006, the collective has participated in the Conflux Art Festival in New York, the Dumbo Arts Festival in Brooklyn and a number of YouTube based Performance events at Postmasters Gallery and Monkeytown. The group has exhibited their work in major museums around the world including; MoMA, The Whitney Museum, Jeu du Paume, SF MoMA, Musée D'Art Contemporain de Marseille, The Walker Art Center, Musée d'Art Contemporain de Lyon and M.C.A.
